

FROM FATHER GEORGE'S DESK & GOSPEL REFLECTION

In my previous pastorates I would put together a few thoughts for the bulletin each week under the title "From Father George's Desk". As I begin settling into the normal routine of life (such as it is) here in Latrobe, I am ready to resume my past practice. Sometimes these columns will be theological, sometimes pastoral or spiritual, sometimes it's just sharing practical and necessary information about what's happening in the parishes...and sometimes a combination of all of the above.

Let me say, first and foremost, thanks for your patience during this transition period. I am not unaware of the difficulty of our parishes—or any parish—adjusting to a new pastor. This is my first time as pastor of partner parishes so I am learning some new things as I go. I will be doing a lot of listening and observing over coming weeks to do what I can to keep things rolling as smoothly as possible while we all get used to one another. I am so grateful for the warm welcome and kind words I have received from so many of you already. I am especially indebted to Father John, Deacon Mike, and the members of the parish staffs for all of their assistance and support, as well as their patience, since my arrival.

I look forward to getting to know you better in the coming weeks, months, and years. There will be the usual hiccups and bumps that are a natural part of any transition so I ask for your patience as I get accustomed to parish life here and as you get used to me. I also ask your forgiveness in advance for one of my most glaring shortcomings: while I am great at recognizing faces, I am absolutely horrible at remembering names. So please don't be offended if I ask your name more than twice; it will take me some time be able to put your name with your face. Let us pray for the guidance and direction of the Holy Spirit so that in all we do, individually and collectively as a parish family, we may always be faithful in doing the work Christ has given us to--to proclaim his good news and to build up the Kingdom of God!

Bishop Kulick will be coming to Latrobe to formally install me as pastor, on Monday evening at St. John the Evangelist and on Tuesday evening at Holy Family. Mass both evenings will begin at 6:00PM, with a light reception to follow. I hope that you will make plans to attend.

TODAY'S GOSPEL: MATTHEW 18: 21-35 & GOSPEL REFLECTION: BY CAROLINE MASSETTO

God's love is limitless! Now I think that is something that we all have some concept of, but it is really explicitly stated in this Gospel. Let me explain – the use of __numbers in this passage is highly relevant and meaningful. According to leading scriptural scholars, Matthews Gospel was written with a primarily Jewish audience in mind. To the Jewish people, the numbers 7 and 77 had significant meanings. "7" was considered a perfect number, signifying wholeness or completeness— God rested on the 7th day when creation was completed. So, for Peter to offer seven as the number of times to forgive someone was a pretty generous amount in his mind!

Christ takes things a step further-"I say to you, not seven times but seventy-seven times." The number 77 means *no limits*, as we can infer from Genesis passages referencing sevenfold and seventy-sevenfold. Matthew knew the impact Christ's statement would have on the Jewish people, highlighting it as Christ's clear message as prelude to the parable about limitlessness.

How does this equate to God's love? We know Jesus tells us that God will forgive us seventy-sevenfold times. In the Gospel, we hear, "That is why the kingdom of heaven may be likened ..." before Christ describes a forgiving master. So God's kingdom, where he is the master, grants this same limitless forgiveness. Where must forgiveness come from? Love! Without love, can you *truly* forgive someone else? Is it forgiveness if there is no love in your heart? No! God puts no limits on how much he will forgive us, because there is no limit to his love for us.

Starving for Heaven every day

Indeed, every day, Catholics are encouraged to cultivate a hunger and longing for Heaven. This spiritual appetite serves as a constant reminder of their ultimate destination and purpose in life.

The idea of "starving for Heaven every day" emphasizes the importance of daily spiritual nourishment. It reflects the belief that the desire for Heaven should not be a passive or occasional sentiment but an active, daily pursuit. Just as one needs daily sustenance for the body, Catholics are taught to seek daily sustenance for the soul through prayer, reflection, and acts of love and kindness.

Additionally, Catholics engage in daily acts of love and charity, echoing the teachings of Jesus to love their neighbors as themselves. This is seen as a practical expression of their desire for Heaven. By demonstrating love and kindness to others, they not only follow Christ's example but also prepare themselves for the heavenly community where love reigns supreme.

The hunger for Heaven also implies a detachment from worldly distractions and temptations that might divert one from their ultimate goal. This detachment is not a rejection of the world but rather a prioritization of eternal values over temporary pleasures. By daily choosing to focus on the eternal, Catholics strengthen their resolve to follow the path that leads to Heaven.

Moreover, the hunger for Heaven encourages Catholics to reflect on their lives regularly. They examine their actions, seek forgiveness for their sins, and strive for personal growth and spiritual development. This introspection serves as a compass, guiding them toward the Heavenly destination they long for.

In the end, "starving for Heaven every day" is a powerful metaphor that encapsulates the idea that the desire for Heaven should be an ever-present, driving force in a Catholic's life. It's a call to embrace the Christian journey with a fervent and unrelenting pursuit of eternal communion with God, recognizing that this daily hunger and yearning shapes their character, choices, and ultimately, their destiny.
